

**The Storm**

Dark black clouds moved quickly

The storm went as quickly as it came

*Did you notice that the writer didn't use any punctuation?*

**Punctuation** tells the reader **how** to read the text. It indicates where to pause (with a comma) and where to stop (with a full stop). The writer has broken the words into lines, but has not used punctuation (apart from using a capital letter at the start of each pair of lines). Here is another copy of the poem, without punctuation.

**Put in punctuation, where *you* would like it to go.**

*Now read aloud your version of the poem, with the punctuation.*

Here is **one way** to punctuate and read this poem. *Is it like yours? Or different?* Try reading this **aloud**, observing all the punctuation.

Howling winds blew wildly, sweeping up things in their path.

Forked lightning struck and lit up the blackened sky.

Angry thunder crashed, banged and bumped.

**Nouns** are names of things. Here is a list of the nouns in this poem. Put a dot under each of these nouns, on the page 1 copy of the poem.

**Adjectives** are describing words. Circle all of the describing words below. The words are from this poem.

*Hint: Only 2 words are not adjectives. Those 2 words are nouns.*

dark      blackened      thunder      black      howling

When a word is used to describe an action, it is called an **adverb**.  
**An adverb describes a verb** (a doing word).

An example of an adverb in this poem is in line 3: quickly, which describes how the clouds moved. Moved is the action word, the verb. Quickly is the describing word, the adverb.

Another example is the adverb 'wildly' which describes the verb 'blew'.

Think of some other words which *could* be used to describe rain.  
The words might be adjectives or adverbs.

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Think of some other words that *could* be used to describe lightning  
(adjectives or adverbs).

Think of some more words to describe a storm - **words which you have not already used (adjectives, adverbs, verbs or nouns).**

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**Poems** often have rhyming words at the end of each line - but that doesn't *have* to happen. If you wanted to write a rhyming poem on this same subject - a storm - can you think of words you *might* use, which rhyme with each of these words?
